#### **Context Statement**

Lonsdale Heights Primary School caters for students from R-6. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2023 is 80. Lonsdale Heights Primary School is classified as Category 2 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 11% Aboriginal students, 24% students with disabilities, 5% children/young people in care. # **Governing Council Report**

I would like to thank the staff for their hard work over the course of 2023. The re-roofing project added enormously to everyone's workload with staff having to pack up learning spaces and administration and move to new areas. The project includes replacing all the roofs and ceilings in the whole school and includes all mechanical structure replacement such as air conditioning and lighting. It's a big job and most likely will be completed around Term 3 next year, with the Preschool area being worked on during the 2024 Christmas break.

We had a strong band of Governing Council members this year and I would like to Therese, Tori, Tracey, Chloe, Chantelle, Jasmine for representing the parent body at meetings.

Students (and staff) were very appreciative of our Canteen volunteers who worked tirelessly to provide delicious food recess and lunch orders. Our band of volunteers, Tracey, Chloe, Amy, Jasmine were capably led by Therese.

In February, our Preschool underwent our regular assessment by ACECQA. While we met standards in most areas, we do have some areas to develop. Throughout 2023, the Principal and preschool teacher worked collaboratively on developing an improvement plan, ready for our reassessment.

At the end of the year we had larger than usual cohort for our Year 6 graduation. I was privileged to represent the school community and gave a speech to the 14 students and their families. The celebration consisted of students being presented to their families, sharing their learning and social goals and culminated in a supper after for students and families.



# Performance Summary NAPLAN Proficiency




# **Attendance Comment**

In South Australia, preschool attendance is not compulsory, but it is strongly encouraged. Preschool gives children the best opportunity to develop skills, which prepare them for school. These benefits include establishing positive routines and habits, friendships and connections as well as developing communication, problem-solving and creative skills. All children are entitled to access a preschool program over 4 terms the year before they start school.

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or non-government school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.
